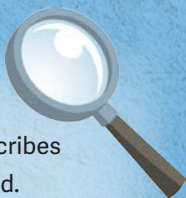

## Nurturing: The Believers are Supported

Key Verse — 1 Corinthians 3:6-9

During the previous three lessons, we learned about an orchard of Super Trees that was eventually planted all over the world. These Super Trees grew Super Food that could feed all people. Of course the main factor in growing these trees was the scientist's *Super Nutrient Formula*.

We also learned that there is a very real need to feed the world something more than regular food. Far more important is the ability to feed them the Gospel of Jesus Christ and help them to grow strong churches. But just how are seven billion people going to hear about Jesus?

It's the same plan that God set up 2,000 years ago, and it still works today. It takes a Messenger who carries the Message. Not everyone answers this call to go and reach the world outside of their homeland, but some do. Even if we don't go, we still have an obligation to help missionaries "plant trees" around the

world. Those trees are new churches and those new churches need lots of the Super Nutrient Formula" (also known as the Bible).

In 1 Corinthians 3:6-9, Paul is writing to Christians in Corinth about this very thing, *"I have planted, Apollos watered; but God gave the increase. So then neither is he that planteth any thing, neither is he that watereth; but God that giveth the increase. Now he that planteth and he that watereth are one; and every man shall receive his own reward according to his own labour. For we are labourers together with God: ye are God's husbandry, ye are God's building."* Paul, the best Biblical example of a missionary, is telling the Christians in the church at Corinth that they each have a job to do. Each individual in the church has a separate, unique job that they need to accomplish. Just as someone plants a seed and another comes and waters it, so are we to do the same with the Gospel. Everyone cannot be a missionary to a foreign country. Not everyone will be a pastor. But everyone is commanded by God to do their part; whether it's planting, watering, cultivating, or harvesting.
